



NOT DRUNK

Idon't watch much sport on television, but I get to see bits of it on news bulletins. I have noticed that the scoring of a goal precipitates an outbreak of enthusiasm that seems to be entirely disproportionate to what has been achieved. Grown men fling themselves upon one another in shameless embraces which they would never be seen doing at other times.



Enthusiasm grips people for any number of reasons. Some become immensely animated simply by watching a horse raceespecially when they have wagered on one of the runners. Others exhibit unusual sentimentality at weddings and christenings, while not a few discover depths of feeling when they have consumed much liquor. They are more impassioned; they speak with exaggerated volume and conviction. Sometimes they evidence

inappropriate levels of emotion; singing, laughing or crying in a surplus fashion, giving onlookers the impression that something is not quite right.

On the day of Pentecost, a group of one hundred and twenty or so, were suddenly seized by a forceful enthusiasm. They became enlivened beyond normal. They were zestful and animated. Unable to contain their fervor, it poured from their lips in forms of speech far in excess of ordinary utterance.

Something extraordinary *was* happening. The question was: What does it mean? Onlookers, knowingly, began to make fun of them. They had seen this kind of behavior before; 'they have had too much wine' (Acts 2:12, 13).

The excited ones were a group who professed faith in One named Jesus of Nazareth who had recently been crucified. Peter, their spokesman, made an attempt to explain. "These men are not drunk, as you suppose, it's only nine in the

morning" (Acts 2:15). He went on to assert that God was the cause of the commotion. He made a speech mentioning God many times. He said (Acts 2:17-24) that the event in question had been anticipated by God through the prophet Joel; God foresaw it and set it in motion. It was in fulfillment of God's plan that Jesus of Nazareth was born. Further, God was also involved in the crucifixion. This man, Jesus, had God's signature on him; God accredited him by means of various signs (verse 22).

Peter didn't finish there. He said that despite strong evidence of Jesus' close connection

with God, his own people had rejected him. They went along with their leaders in their plot to kill him. "You put him to death by nailing him on a cross" (Acts 2:23). In other words: You



extinguished the light of God that shone among you.

Remember, Peter was attempting to account for an enthusiasm that the public believed was caused by excess drinking. His explanation was that it was not alcohol, but God! Despite that Jesus' entire history was caused and supervised by God, the people had despised him and executed him. Now, God had overturned that execution by raising Jesus from the dead. God had removed the world's verdict against Jesus and replaced it with his own by resurrecting him.

"This man was handed over to you by God's set purpose and foreknowledge, and you, with the help of wicked men, put him to death by nailing him to the cross. But God raised him from the dead, freeing him from the agony of death, for it was impossible for death to keep its hold on him" (Acts 2:23, 24).

God's resurrection of Jesus was more than a 'lifeguard-like' resuscitation of a corpse. God raised Jesus from death and exalted him to life at his right hand—the most excellent position in the universe. "God has raised this Jesus to life and we are all witnesses of this fact" (Acts 2:32), said Peter.

A man in my home state was released from prison after serving 15 years for the murder

of a teenage girl. His release came after years of hard work by a team of lawyers who believed in this man's innocence. They exposed shoddy police work and poor evidence. The man is now free but still not deemed innocent by the court. Much arduous work remains to be done before a judge will be persuaded to quash the original verdict.

Compare God's reply to the world's verdict against Jesus. He did not merely set it aside, he cancelled it. He negated the whole movement of world opinion that was against Jesus. He dismantled it by raising him from the dead and elevating him to the place of highest honor and power.

The resurrection meant that the human consensus was invalidated and replaced by the values of the Crucified One. The One who cannot be subjected, who cannot be brought to an end by any human power or authority—he is divine; his values are those of God.

Before the cross, the disciples had begun to think that God had come to them in Jesus. When he was killed, they lost hope. But when they knew that he was alive again, they were convinced that they had walked and talked with the Son of God. It was clear to them that God had been in everything that had happened. The crucifixion did not stymie God's plan; it was part of it.

The coming of the Spirit at Pentecost confirmed that Christ was alive and active in the world. The disciple's ecstasy had everything to do with the kind of person they knew Jesus to be. Many people die; some are executed making few sad. There are individuals who, if they were to return from death, would make no one happy.

My dad knew everyone in my hometown. He attended every funeral. Once a neighboring farmer died so, of course, Dad went to the ceremony. Attending the same funeral was a person well-known as a dishonest scoundrel. That very week this scoundrel had fallen from a telegraph pole and cheated death by breaking his arm. Observing him from a pew behind, one man leaned over and whispered in Dad's ear: "Why couldn't it have been him that died; no one would have missed him!"

In the Resurrection, the most exquisite personality that ever lived overcame death. It was the attributes of Jesus that the grave could not contain. This was the realization that caused joy to overflow at Pentecost. Though men and women make much effort in pursuit of material gains, they instinctively know that life is not worth living without values that are spiritual. Truth, beauty, integrity, purity, trust, honesty, tolerance, compassion and justice—all these virtues had been

lived and died for by Jesus. Though they themselves had pursued them with questionable success, they knew now that they had been perfectly and exhaustively enacted by Jesus.

Further, they knew with certainty now that forgiveness was part of the indestructible makeup of the universe. They knew that whatever the deficit of their own personalities, the forgiving grace of God would never fail them. A man, a woman could give themselves over to the values of Jesus—the highest



values of love—and despite falling short still live fulsomely without guilt or regret, and with profound purpose. Any and every task or relationship conducted under the auspices of Jesus could never be in vain, never be lost.

Since Christ has risen, time and chance are not the final arbiters of destiny. Since Jesus is alive, we cannot live as if all things will continue as they have always been. Part of the excitement at Pentecost was because the disciples believed they were witnessing the culmination of history. A new kind of time had arrived—the time of the end. The chief questions and problems of existence had met with a solution.

A river ran for several miles along the boundary of my dad's farm. We played for hours in that river during long summer days. I learned to swim there. To be able to swim across the river and stand on the far bank was a rite of passage for us kids. Sometimes there would be a 'fresh' when the river flowed deeper and faster than usual. As a small boy I was a bit scared to swim over. But when dad came with us, he would swim across and stand all-conquering on the far bank. He beckoned me to come. Seeing him there with his eye on me and calling to me gave me courage. I felt confident in my connection to him. So I swam while he watched, and soon I stood triumphant with him on the other side.

Christians are not drunk; they have no need to be. But they are jubilant, full of joy. They know what their life is for and whither it is bound. The claws of fate cannot crush them; they are in the hands of Him who will never let them go; his love is stronger than death; they will cross all rivers to be with him on the other side, forever.

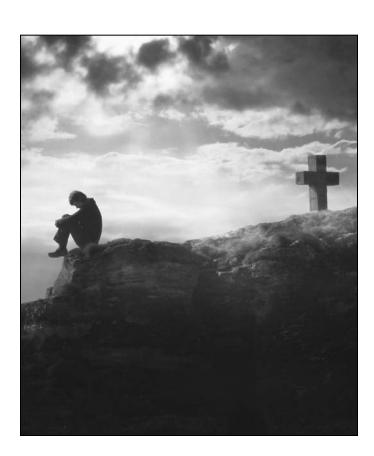

There was something that he covered constantly by abrupt silence or impetuous isolation. There was some one thing that was too great for God to show us when he walked upon our earth; and I have sometimes fancied that it was his mirth.

A WORLD FOREVER **CHANGED**

Tt was no mere interest in immortality which explains this ▲apostolic concentration on the Resurrection. It was not as a dramatic verification of personal survival that they preached Christ risen from the dead. They were not really concerned with proofs and theories of survival as such. All that was irrelevant. They preached the Resurrection as an eschatological, that is, as a cosmic event. When Christ left the grave, it was not merely an announcement that there is a hereafter and a life beyond;

...it was a shattering of history by a creative act of God Almighty. God was doing something comparable only with what he had done at the first creation. This was the beginning of a new era for the universe, the decisive turning-point for the human race.

The Resurrection meant that the world had died in the night and had been reborn. When Paul met the risen Christ on the Damascus road, the blinding thing about the encounter—it literally blinded him for three days—was that in that moment he looked face to face, without any veil between, upon the eternal purpose of God. Thus the apostles went out to preach, knowing that

...in the Resurrection the new age had arrived, and that this stupendous miracle signified the storming of history and the transforming of the world.
